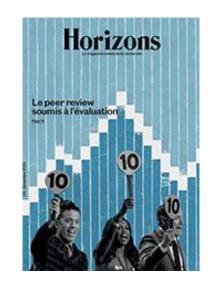

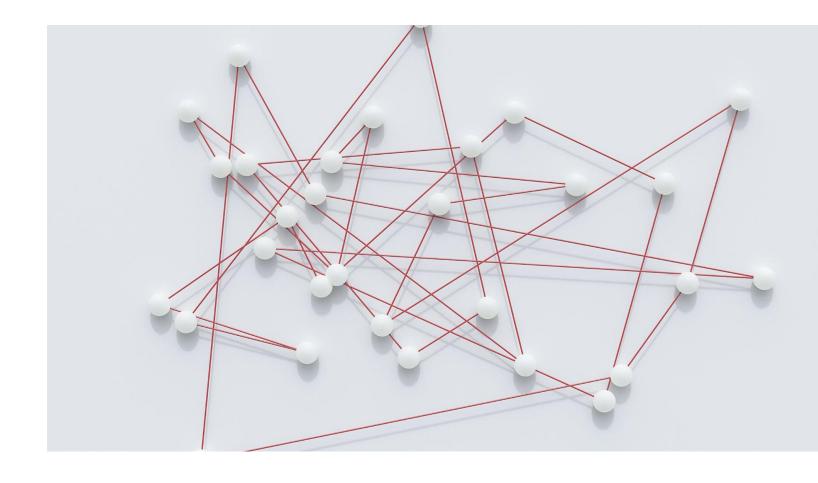

COST: European Cooperation in Science and Technology

COST is the longest-running European framework supporting cooperation among researchers, engineers and scholars since 1971 by enabling them to jointly develop their own ideas and new initiatives across all fields in science and technology, including social sciences and humanities.

COST funds pan-European, **bottom-up networks**, so-called 'COST Actions'. These networks promote international coordination of **nationally-funded research**.

COST: European Cooperation in Science and Technology

Switzerland is one of the 19 **founding countries of COST** and one of currently 41 **Full Members** of the COST Association, an intergovernmental organisation mostly funded through the European Framework programmes.

Therefore, researchers in Switzerland are entitled to participate in all COST Activities and eligible for reimbursement.

In addition, the SNSF organises a **yearly COST Call** for research projects with a budget of **6 million CHF** to fund research projects originating from COST Actions.



Participating in COST: 3 Possibilities

- 1. Participating in an ongoing **COST Action**
 - Working Group(s)
 - Management Committee
 - Events
- 2. Submitting a proposal for a **new COST Action** to the COST Association
 - Collection date 1x per year in October
- 3. Submitting a proposal for a research project to the SNSF COST Call

What is the SNSF COST Call?

Aim

- Research funding in addition to networking;
- Strengthens COST Actions;
- Enhancing international collaboration and the position of Swiss research and researchers in the European research field;
- Support of early career researchers.

Eligibility Criteria

- General eligibility criteria of the SNSF;
- Min. 1 year after completion of PhD;
- Thematically open, but connected to an eligible ongoing COST Action;
- Applicant needs to be actively engaged in the COST Action (MC, WG).



What is the SNSF COST Call?

Duration

 Project duration of up to 4 years (max. 48 months).

Eligible costs

Funding of up to CHF 400'000 for 4 years:

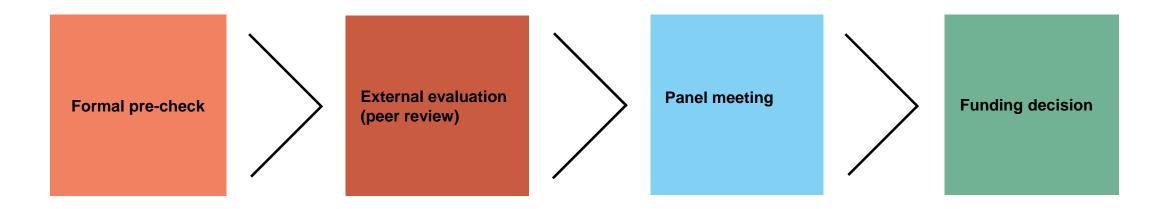
- Salaries, social security contributions and other costs related to project staff;
- Research costs: equipment, consumables, collaboration costs, field expenses;
- Projects partners,
 subcontracting, use of external infrastructure (max 20%).

Deadlines

- Optional (recommended) preregistration;
- Deadline: 1x per year, usually in mid-April.



Evaluation Procedure



Communication of decision: early November



Evaluation Criteria

- 1. Scientific relevance, topicality and originality;
- 2. Added value through participation in the respective COST Action;
- 3. Suitability of methods and feasibility;
- 4. Scientific qualifications of the researchers: scientific track record and ability to carry out the research project.



Information on Submitting a COST Project Proposal

Submission: via mySNF

- The call opens three months before the application deadline;
- Optional (recommended) pre-registration;
- If you do not yet have a mySNF user account, please register at least one month before the submission deadline.

Information on Submitting a COST Project Proposal

Research Plan

- In English;
- Max. 14 pages and max. 55,000 characters (including spaces).

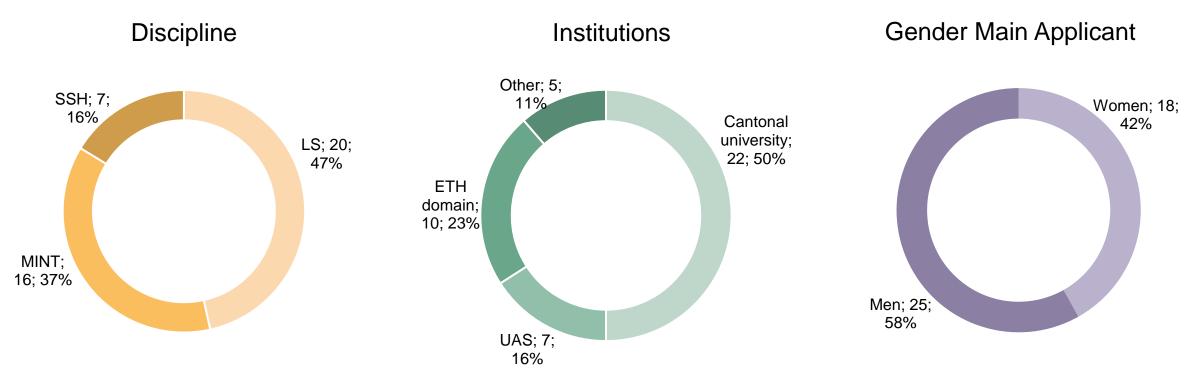
Contents:

- Summary of the research plan (max. 1 page);
- Current state of research in the field;
- Current state of own research;
- Detailed research plan;
- Schedule and milestones;
- Relevance, added value in the COST Action and impact;
- Bibliography
- Revised applications: A word document that responds point-for-point to the critique raised in the rejection letter.

AGORA: where research meets the public

The Agora scheme aims to foster dialogue between scientists and society. It encourages researchers to communicate their current research to an audience of lay people in Switzerland.

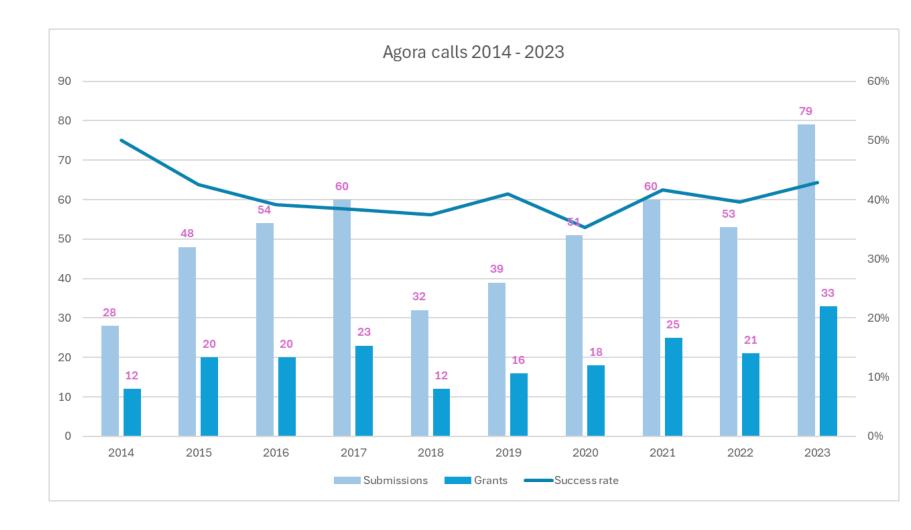


- Science communication projects → projects must be submitted jointly by a researcher and a communications expert
- The topic communicated must be clearly linked to research recently conducted by the applicant(s)
- The projects address an audience that is non-specialised in the communicated topic
- The chosen means must encourage a dialogue between researchers and target audience



Agora 2014-2023:

- 504 submitted proposals
- 200 projects granted
- success rate ~40%





Agora (CHF 5'000-200'000)

Annual call
September 2025 (tbc)
6 months until decision

Agora Rolling Call (CHF 5'000-50'000)

Submission at any time

4 months before the start of the project

Overview of participation requirements



- Collaboration: researcher and communications expert (Agora specialist).
- Eligibility: researchers are employed min. 20% at an eligible institution during the project.
- Expertise: shown through a narrative CV.
- Scientific link: (peer-reviewed) research recently conducted by the researcher applicant(s).
- Engagement: methods must foster direct dialogue between researchers and audience.

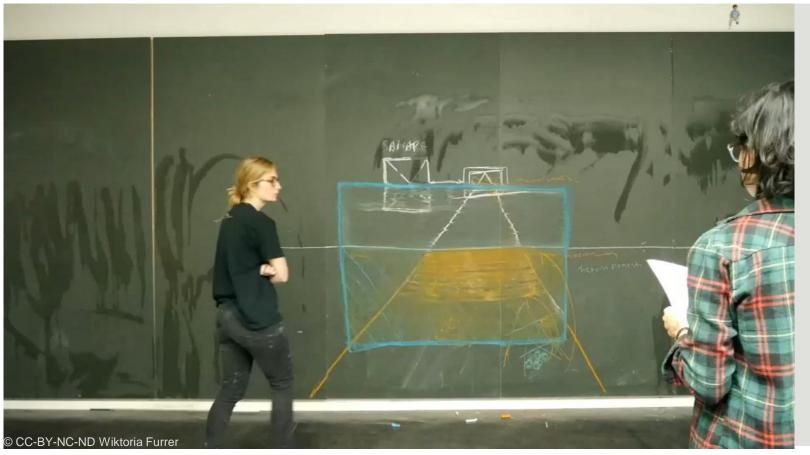


Project plan: Guidelines



- 1. Summary maximum 1 page
- 2. Project description maximum 40'000* / 20'000** characters (with spaces, tables and figures) on maximum of 10* / 5** pages
 - 1. Context
 - 2. Methods
 - 3. Implementation
 - 4. Expected impact
- 3. Bibliography

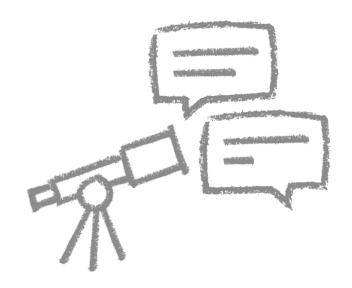
Some input

Do

- Dialogue is key.
- Work with science communication/mediation professionals.
- Be specific and concrete where possible.
- Check the consistency between communication goals, target audiences and means of communication.
- Talk about the methods and ways of doing research, not just its results.

Don't

- Avoid the "deficit-learning model", i.e., involve the public instead of educating them.
- The target audience should neither be academic nor scientific nor too vague.
- Avoid overlooking the potential impact of the project and how to evaluate it (qualitatively and/or quantitatively).
- Do not forget to make explicit in what way your project contributes to EDI.





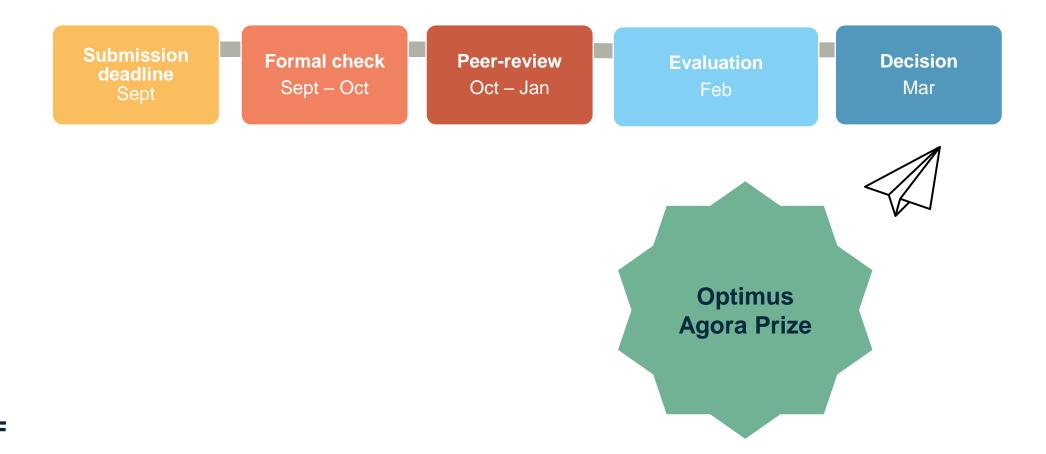
Evaluation criteria

- Expertise of the project applicants and co-applicants.
- Quality of the content to be communicated.
- Suitability of the methods or the communication design in view of the defined target group.
- Feasibility of the project.
- Expected impact in terms of quality and quantity.
- Contribution to the promotion of diversity and equal opportunities.

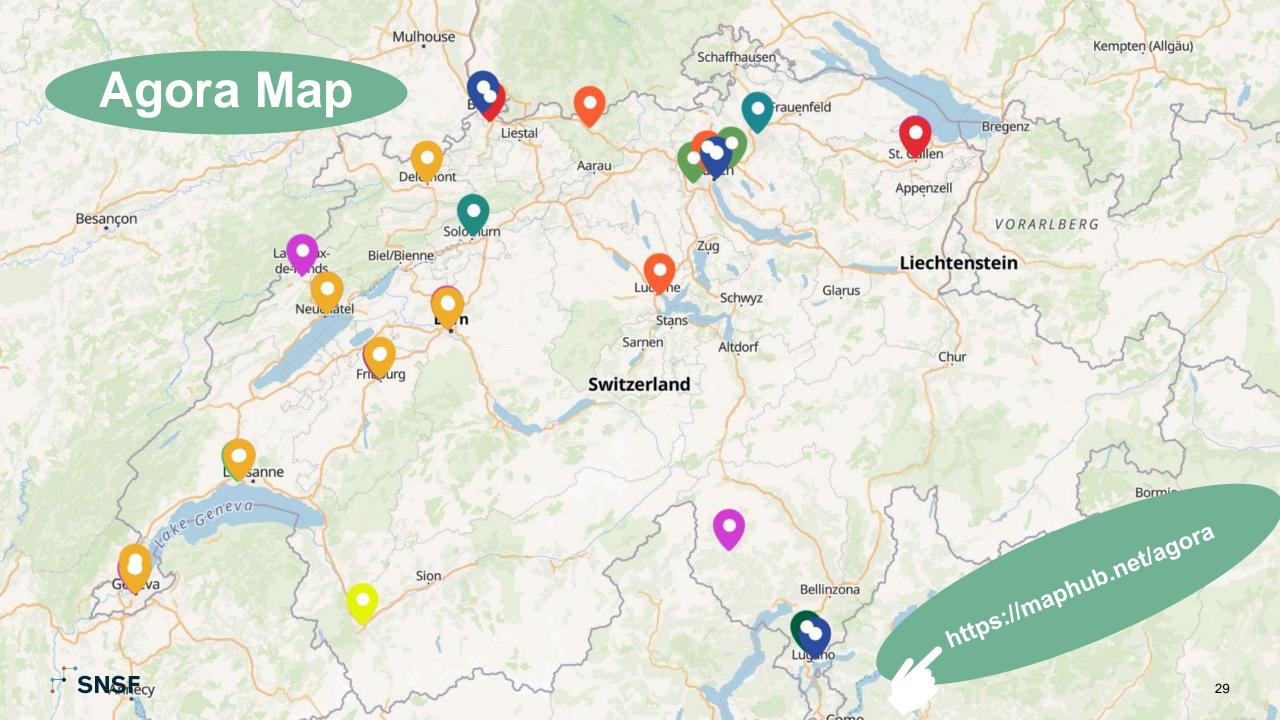

OVERVIEW OF PROJECT CONTRIBUTIONS IN INTERNATIONAL PROJECTS



FOR EUROSTARS PROJECTS AND EU THEMATIC PARTNERSHIPS

Direct project funding:

- Start-ups and SMEs up to 50%
- Large companies up to 25%
- Swiss research partners up to 50% (Eurostars) and 100% (EU-Partnerships)
- Specified in each call



FOR EUREKA AND BILATERAL PROJECTS

Innosuisse covers a maximum of 70% of the project costs of the Swiss participants.

Direct project funding:

- SMEs and Start-ups to 50%*
- Large companies up to 25%
- Swiss research partners up to 100%
- At least one Swiss or international research partner

*Swiss start-ups that have not yet entered the market and only collaborate with foreign companies can receive up to 70%

WHO IS WHO ACCORDING TO INNOSUISSE FUNDING RULES

START-UP

- founded no more than 5 years ago (up to 10 years possible with justification)
- with scalable product or service
- before market entry: the start-up must not yet offer any products (ready for series production) or services on the market
- have less than 50 FTE when submitting the application

SME

no more than 250 FTE

Large company

more than 250 FTE

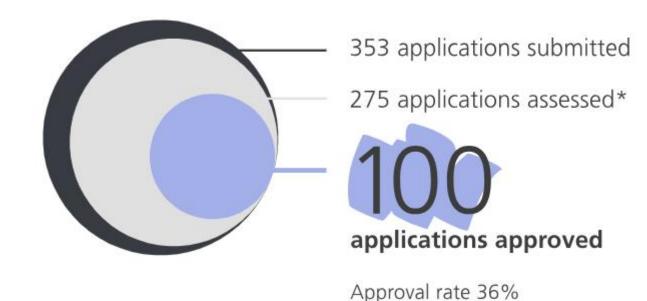

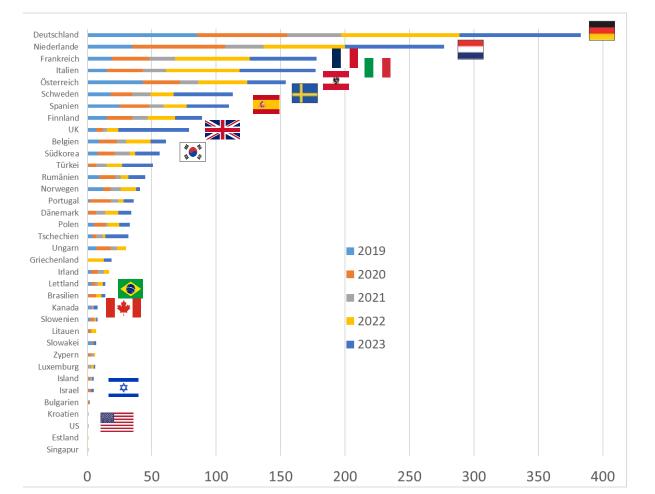

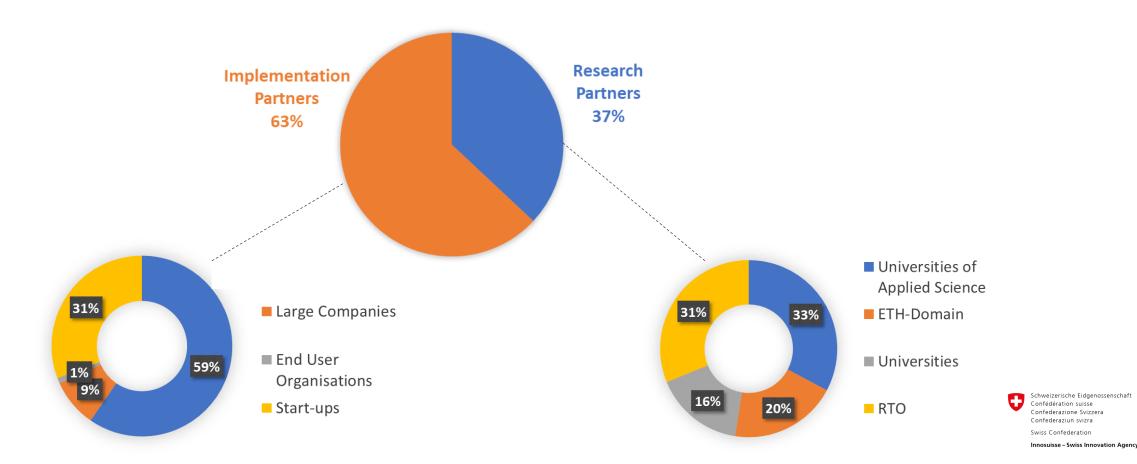
